For 35 years we have worked to improve the lives of young children and their families experiencing homelessness in Massachusetts. We support homeless families exclusively by providing high-quality early education, opportunities for play, and comprehensive family support services.

Nobody knows early childhood homelessness - both the challenges and solutions - better than us.

35 YEAR HISTORY OF INNOVATION Became the first provider in Boston to serve 1988 homeless families exclusively. 1990 Opened our first Playspace in Boston. Began partnership with Harvard's Center 1994 for the Developing Child and opened first Early Childhood Center in Dorchester. 2000 Opened Early Education Center in Jamaica Plain. Opened Early Education Center in Roxbury. 2006 2007 Incorporated mental health services into programming for children. 2008 Integrated CSEFL-based trauma-informed practices into our programs. 2010 Introduced music curriculum. 2016 Adopted Mobility Mentoring[®] coaching model to enhance our practice with parents. 2018 Instituted a partnership with Lesley University to give Horizons staff access to studies in the field of Child Homelessness. Began pursuing certification as a Brazelton 2018 Touchpoints Center. Boston Public Schools' Universal Pre-K 2019 program invested in Horizons through Boston's Expansion Grant, opening several UPK classrooms at the center. WHAT MAKES HORIZONS DIFFERENT?

 We mitigate the impact of homelessness on children's social & emotional, cognitive and gross motor development. Supplemental programming like mental health services and music therapy support this goal.

- We deliver education and care that is sensitive to the trauma that children facing homelessness have experienced. That's reflected in our teacher to student ratios, vigilance around 'trauma triggers' and focus on consistency and routine in the classroom.
- We have a fundamental belief that every parent has strengths. We work to identify those strengths then mentor and empower parents to help themselves out of homelessness.

- We are ranked among the top 5% for quality according to the Massachusetts Quality Rating and Improvement System (QRIS) for Early Education.
- Our work extends beyond the children and families
 we serve directly in our advocacy work. Our advocacy
 work prioritizes legislation, appropriations, and
 regulatory changes in key policy areas including
 housing, early education and care, and anti-poverty
 and income security.
- Highly-skilled early educators are key to success for children in poverty and Horizons has taken bold steps to ensure our pay and benefits structure appropriately values our team's work and supports the growth of a truly inclusive and equitable workforce.

OUR COMMITMENT TO DEI

At Horizons, we are conscious that systemic racism, bias, classism, and poverty contribute to the national crisis of family homelessness. We know that to deliver the best possible services to our families and create the optimal environment for all members of the organization, we must actively work to ensure we set the standard for a more diverse, inclusive, and equitable culture.

OUTCOMES

Horizons employs a two-generation model that is well respected in Massachusetts and nationwide. Since opening our doors, Horizons has served 5,000 children in our early education centers and has provided access to play to over 20,000 children through our Playspace Program.

Children who attend our early education centers move on to excel in public and private school settings. By providing supports to their parents, their long term prospects for academic and professional success are even greater.

Horizons uses evidence-based practices for proven impact. By partnering with Head Start, Brazelton Institute at Boston Children's Hospital, NAEYC and other recognized programs, we've adopted and contributed to the best practices that exist to support children and families facing homelessness.
